TRAINING DIRECTOR AWARDED FELLOWSHIP TO UNDERTAKE RESEARCH IN BUILDING AND CONSTRUCTION



Peter Jacobson, Director of Training, Trades College has been awarded the 2013 International Building and **Construction Fellowship.**

The fellowship was awarded through a competitive national process that included an interview by a selection panel. The panel consisted of the fellowship sponsor, industry representatives and members of the International Specialised Skills (ISS) Institute.

The scholarship is a joint venture between the Construction and Property Services Industry Skills Council (CPSISC) and the ISS Institute.

The ISS \$12,500 Fellowship promotes the acquisition of higher-level skills and an appreciation of international best practice in the Australian building, construction and property services industries.

It is intended to examine innovative approaches that demonstrate potential benefits for, and application in, Australia.

Peter aims to reinvigorate in the Australian building and construction industries through the study of apprenticeship education practices across Europe, particularly Germany who has a high participation rate in apprenticeships.

Peter's research will also contribute to the University's ambition to become a centre of excellence for vocational education, and identify new ways to optimise the Construction Hub at the Sunshine Campus.

"It's fantastic news and I'm very excited that VU will gain more recognition for its trades programs." says Peter. "This will be a good opportunity to see how student mentorship models in trades training and retention strategies are done in other countries, and what we can learn from them."

VU's Diploma of Specialist Make-Up Services equips students with the range of specialist skills required for a future as a make-up artist be it photographic, theatre, period, special effects, television, film or fashion. It is the only make-up course in Australia to encompass fashion and the arts.

Students of Victoria University's Diploma of Specialist Make-Up Services showcased their extraordinary skills as they transformed volunteer models into characters from movies, books and their imaginations at VU's bi-annual Night of Notables held at Southbank's Showtime Events Centre in December.

The Night of Notables is part of the graduation process for students completing the year-long Diploma program. VIPs and industry guests mixed with friends and families of students to marvel at the creativity and talent of the students as they exhibited their graduating projects.

This year, 65 students created the likes of Marie Antoinette, Nanny McPhee, Amy

Winehouse, The Joker, an Avatar, and Sleeping Beauty, among many other wellknown fictional, historical and real-life characters.

Students spent hundreds of hours to create every aspect of their characters, including fashioning wigs, constructing prostheses, designing costumes, and applying body and face make-up.

Liana Milne, 23, originally from Traralgon, won this year's Specialist Make-Up Student of the Year for her leadership, teamwork, creativity and skills. She also received awards for best wig and the industry award (sponsored by Kryolan Professional Make Up) for her extravagant creation of a fairyfloss-like pink-haired Marie Antoinette.

"VU's specialist make-up course has been amazing," says Liana. "I didn't know anything like this existed before I enrolled, but it was exactly what I was looking for.

BUILDING TEACHER TO BRING HOME GREEN RETRO KNOW-HOW

Trades College Carpentry and Joinery Teacher Michael Hick is heading off to the northern hemisphere to investigate the latest in green retrofitted building products.

The Trades College teacher at Sunshine Campus was awarded a 2013 Higher Education and Skills Group Overseas Fellowship Victoria ahead of applicants from across Australia (Victorian Category).

Valued at \$13,000, Mr Hick will use the money to travel to the US and the UK, and bring home what he learns so that new and innovative green building practices can be incorporated into VET (Vocational Education and Training) training at VU. The next generation of local builders will then have the latest knowledge to create more sustainable and energy efficient dwellings.

"Being selected for a fellowship is a wonderful feeling," says Mr Hick. "As is being given the chance to investigate sustainability and retrofitting on an international platform.

"It's a topic that has really started to take over the way I think about building practices;

to work towards a more sustainable and environmentally friendly building Industry."

There is limited knowledge in Australia on sustainable retrofitting and Mr Hick aims to find the best products and practices available that can be transferred to the Australian building and construction industry at minimal cost and time.

He will look at retrofitted items such as windows, doors and cladding as well as investigate new building techniques for the installation of walls, roofs and floors in both residential and commercial buildings.

"I am hoping my findings will help VU become a leader in sustainable building practices."

Mr Hick's fellowship application was backed by Australia's Construction and Property Services Industry Skills Council and Sustainability Victoria. These organisations believe Mr Hick's fellowship has the potential to drive innovation and change through the use of sustainable practices and products, and assist Victorians to be more energy efficient and reduce their carbon footprint.

TRADE SKILLS GLITTER WITH GOLD

Victoria University Trades College students won 9 gold medals in the 2013 Regional WorldSkills competitions - known as the Olympics of vocational training.

The day long competitions provided almost 50 VU students with the opportunity to showcase their passion and talent in fields ranging from beauty care to welding.

VU's Trades College has long hosted regional competitions, which this year included six other training organisations from Melbourne and country Victoria.

Kath Curry, Dean, Trades College, says the competition is testament to what can be achieved through innovative approaches and close links to industry.

Beauty category Gold medallist Lauren Karman says "The day was full-on. I was very nervous. I had to familiarise myself with new products and I was surprised when I

"You can get lost in your day-to-day work" says Steven Di Berardino, winner of the Joinery category. "The good thing about the competition is that you can prove to yourself that you've got the skills."

All regional gold medallists are eligible to compete in a three-day WorldSkills National competition in Perth in 2014.

Gold medallist in Heavy Fabrication-Welding Darren Barnes says he's keen to go to Perth and test himself against Australia's

"Imagine winning the nationals and then winning the internationals" says Carpentry Gold medallist James Brettel. "You could put 'Best in the World' on your CV."

POWERING UP SPARKIES' CAREERS

Innovative workplace learning opportunities at Victoria University's Trades College are giving electrical apprentices a powerful start to their careers.

The challenge facing electrical apprentices is that to become a qualified electrician they must gain skills often unattainable in their current workplace. Working exclusively in one electrical industry – domestic, commercial or industrial – usually means there is limited opportunity for cross-skilling across the three specialisations.

To overcome this, the Trades College's electrical apprentice training includes working on large 'real-life' projects. Apprentices gain the practical work experience on projects not accessible through their employer.

This not only gives them the extra skills they need to gain their trade certificate, but enhances their employment options after graduating.

Second-year electrical apprentice Luke Twentyman is employed at the North Laverton site of NHP Electrical Engineering Products.

"At work I have my own workstation and build electrical circuits," says Luke. "But to get fully qualified and earn more money, I need to be able to do all types of electrical work. The VU practical training gives me the experience I can't get at work."

Twentyman and his classmates have been applying their domestic electrical skills to

transportable houses produced by VU's carpentry apprentices. Under the guidance of teacher Stan Borysiewicz, the electrical apprentices install the internal wiring and data cabling for the houses, which are snapped up by buyers across the state.

"A number of our electrical apprentices are working in large industrial and manufacturing industries," says Stan. "We work closely with their employers to ensure they gain the domestic electrical experience necessary to complete their apprenticeships. Working on real projects means higher quality, complex training that develops skilled job-ready graduates."

VU's Trades College also offers flexible learning options and new assessment practices.

A LONG FIRE SEASON FOR ROBBIE

VU carpentry teacher at Sunshine Campus Robbie Greaves has been spending a lot of time lately putting out fires. Robbie is a volunteer fire fighter and a longstanding member of the Hoppers Crossing CFA as well as the Deniliquin RFS (Rural Fire Service) in western NSW, where he has family.

When the horrific bushfires in NSW's Blue Mountains got out of hand last October, Robbie put down his tools and headed off to help put those fires out. Placing his own life at risk, he helped save a few towns around Lithgow and perhaps a few of the locals' lives.

There were more fires to put out leading up to Christmas, and then during January's 40-plus degree heatwave he was back in NSW, this time fighting scrub fires in the outback.

"Last year, the fire season started in October, and that's much earlier than usual," says Robbie. "And it looks like going right through to March."

Officially, fire fighters are not supposed to work more than a 12-hour shift. "But it's hard to walk away when a fire is still raging," he says.

Robbie's son Ricky – a carpenter like his dad – is also a member of the Hoppers CFA crew, and father and son are both often called out to fight the same fire. "But we always travel in different trucks," says Robbie. "In case something awful happens."

But it's not just bush and scrub fires they have to deal with. "Most of our CFA jobs are putting out house and car fires," says Robbie.

He says the University has been fantastic in giving him time off when he is called out, and his VU work colleagues back him up "one hundred per cent" while he is away. "My students even text me to see how I'm doing," he says.

In this year's Australia Day Honours list, Robbie was awarded the National Emergency Medal for his services fighting Victoria's Black Saturday fires in 2009.
